From the Pastor Search Committee

Dear First Baptist Waynesboro Family,

The Pastor Search Committee is thrilled to introduce Rev. Justin Moser to the First Baptist Waynesboro family. As you have the opportunity to meet Justin, learn about his faith story and calling to ministry, and hear him preach, we feel that you will be as excited as we are about the future of First Baptist Waynesboro with the possibility of Justin as our next pastor.

The Pastor Search Committee began its work in February of this year. As we began the journey, we quickly realized the daunting task in front of us. However, we drew comfort from intentional prayer of holy indifference inspired by Luke 22:42, "Father, not my will, but yours be done."

After receiving several resumes and referrals from the Baptist General Association of Virginia and members of our church, we partnered with the Center for Health Churches (CHC), to help identify more potential candidates and assist in vetting candidates based on our core beliefs and a summary of the "must haves" from the listening sessions. CHC provided the committee with the names of nine potential candidates along with resumes, links to sermon videos, and a brief summary of why the CHC felt each candidate was a good potential pastor for First Baptist Waynesboro. Over the next several weeks, we first conducted 30 minute introductory interviews and then two hour interviews with each candidate. During this phase of the discernment process, committee members were also viewing the candidates' sermons and completing score cards based on the priorities identified in the congregational listening sessions.

After completing all the interviews, the team met for prayer and much discussion during which we were led to focus on three candidates. Each of these three candidates were invited to an additional more in-depth interview and the team began a deeper time of prayer, discussion, and discernment as well as reaching out to the candidates' references. Everyone agreed Justin was the candidate to whom God was leading us. We invited Justin and his wife, Ellie, to Waynesboro as an opportunity for them to learn more about our community and for us to learn more about their ministry individually and as a family. Without hesitation following our in-person time with Justin the Pastor Search Committee unanimously decided to present Justin to the congregation as the candidate God was leading us to.

We have been blessed to serve our God and our church in this process. As you meet Justin and his family, we hope you will sense God's calling as we have.

More About Justin

Belief Statement

I believe in the one true God who has eternally existed as three persons in perfect relationship. God the Father creates, sustains, and rules over all things. God the Son became human in the person of Jesus Christ, fully God and fully man, who through his life, crucifixion, burial, and resurrection reveals the character and nature of God and secures salvation for those who would trust and obey him. God the Holy Spirit convicts people of sin, gives gifts to the members of Christ's church, and guides the people of God. I believe the Bible is the true word of God, revealing God's story of redemption and, when interpreted through the ministry and salvific work of Jesus Christ, carries full and final authority in matters of faith and practice. I believe that the core of Baptist identity is not a confession, but rather what Walter B. Shurden calls the "Four Fragile Freedoms" (Bible freedom, soul freedom, church freedom, and religious freedom).

What's been your biggest joy in ministry?

There is so much about ministry that I love, but what brings me the most joy is getting to experience what God is doing in the lives of people. Whether it is through a teaching, a sermon, a mission trip, a conversation, officiating a wedding, or being in the hospital room when someone finds out there is nothing more the doctors can do, these are holy moments. Even when the moment is hard and the circumstances are dire, it is a privilege to get to experience how God is alive and active in each of them.

As a church member, what can we do to

encourage and support our pastors?
There are so many things that a church member can do!
Ultimately, pastors are people too. We will have good days and bad days. We will sometimes surprise you and at other times disappoint you. We need members who believe in us. And when we dream and fail, because we most certainly will at some point, we need people full of grace who will walk with us as we find a better way forward. We need people who will love and support our families. While pastors might hold the responsibility of taking the lead on ministry, the work of ministry is ultimately the work of the entire church. In short, pray for us, love us, love our families, show us grace, and do the work of ministry alongside us.

What strategy do you employ for regular biblical study?

Regular engagement with Scripture is, obviously, critical for our growth in Christ. In Scripture we find the story of God and God's people, how people have responded to and interpreted God's actions, and then we are invited to see the world a new way. The way I engage with Scripture on a personal level isn't complex or rocket science. I pick a book of the Bible, rotating it between the different main genres (ex: Old Testament and New Testament; law, history, prophet, wisdom, gospel, Paul's letters, general epistles, etc.) so that I constantly expose myself to the breadth of Scripture. Then, four to five times a week, in addition to the time I already take to prepare lessons and sermons, I take time during my morning to first be silent before God, invite the Spirit into the time of reading usually a chapter or less depending on how long the chapter is, and spend time journaling about things that stuck out to me, surprised me, challenged me, bothered me, encouraged me, and any insights that the Spirit spoke to me about what God might want me to know, who God might want be to be, and what God might want me to do. Honestly, it probably looks a lot less like a strategic method, and more like a conversation between myself, the text (and therefore our ancestors in faith), and God.

Why is it important to come to church?

Church is a vital part of the life of any disciple of Jesus. There are many reasons for this, but, for me, the two most important are these: at church we encounter the inescapable beauty of God's diverse community and during worship at a healthy, God honoring church, we are shaped and formed more and more into the image of Christ. In almost every other area of our lives, we have the ability to be the gatekeepers of who we encounter. But in a church community, God welcomes all and, therefore, we never know who we will meet and how that encounter might further transform us. We were created to be in relationship with God and others. Church is a great place where we can live into both of those purposes. Likewise, everything we do, read, watch, consume, and engage with in this world forms who we are and who we become. Given the fact that the vast majority of our lives are spent in a world that is promoting its own set of values, goals, and visions of what the "good life" looks like. Church, and especially worship, becomes a regular habit that puts us in the position for God's Spirit to form us into the Kingdom's values, goals, and vision for the "good life."
